

## CTBUH Update - January 2005

Dear Colleagues:

The Council, therefore, issues a **CALL FOR PAPERS** for the Congress. The theme, "Renewing the Urban Landscape" will focus on urban renewal projects around the world, new developments in tall building technology, and advancements in sustainable design. Papers are invited on the topics of, but not limited to, Architecture, Development, Urban Planning, Engineering, Construction and Sustainable Design Strategies. **Deadline for submission of abstracts is May 15, 2005.**

Abstracts should be in MS Word and include a maximum of 200-300 words on one 8-1/2"x11" page and should clearly state the objectives of the proposed paper, summarize the subject matter and the substantive issues it will raise, state the conclusion(s) to be presented, and contain a comment on how it would address the conference theme. All abstracts will be peer reviewed, before being accepted, by July 1. Final papers will be due September 1, 2005 for inclusion in the proceedings. All papers selected will be presented during a full-day special session on Tuesday, October 19.

On an important note, Ron Klemencic's role as Chairman of the Council will conclude with the 7<sup>th</sup> World Congress in New York (October 2005). The Council is beginning the process of determining who will be the next Chairman. If you have any suggestions for a replacement or input on this topic we would be happy to hear from you.

It was learned that renowned architect Philip Johnson, famous for his "glass-box" skyscrapers, died last week at the age of 98. Mr. Johnson's work ranged from the fancifully topped AT&T Building in New York to the glass greenhouse-like Crystal Cathedral in Southern California. Mr. Johnson was a devotee of Mies Van der Rohe and invented the term International Style to describe his work. He worked with Mr. Van der Rohe on New York's Seagram Building, designing the interior for the circa-1958 structure.
